### **Background**

The challenge of cultural and political pluralism has become a common area in need of improvement for both established and developing democracies. Reset Dialogues will convene a broad range of scholars, researchers and professionals in the virtual home of Beit al-Hikma in Carthage, Tunisia this Summer. After previous successful editions held in Casablanca (2018 and 2019) and Carthage (2020, online), we will create a forum for in-depth and critical analysis on "Pluralism in Arab and Muslim Societies - Current Trends in the Arts, Culture and Media under Duress", in two parts.

The **Summer School's** courses and workshops will explore the status of pluralism in the Arab and Muslim world and the communities the world over -- from Beirut to Santiago to Detroit and beyond -- as it is lived and experienced in the arts and humanities.

The **Conference** will explore the theme of cultural pluralism in the Media, both traditional and digital, with particular attention paid to information technologies and how news spreads. What are the principal sources of information in the Arab and Muslim World? Who finances them, who owns them, who controls them culturally? Who is in the position to guarantee or impede freedom of speech and the plurality of public discourse?

The following sub-themes will emerge during the <u>Summer School</u> and <u>International Conference</u>: the growing hegemony of the Turkish cultural and political model in the MENA region; the influence of the Gulf countries on cultural trends in North Africa and the Arab diasporas in both hemispheres; contemporary Islam and its reflections in contemporary Arab culture (television, music, storytelling and cinema); artistic-literary production in Arab / Muslim communities; the impact of living in democratic, pluralist societies vis-a-vis environments with fewer freedoms, on creative production among the Arab diasporas.





The program will bring together top-tier academics and intellectuals, alongside young scholars and an international pool of young professionals and opinion leaders from the fields of education, journalism, and social media who have the abilities and potential to reach and engage with a wide public, to discuss vibrant issues of regional and world-scale importance. The working languages of the Seminars are Arabic and English, with simultaneous translation.
